## MATHEMATICS

In Mathematics, the students will further develop their skills of critical thinking and problem solving through the exploring the concepts of whole number, addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, position, length and 2D shapes.

#### **SCIENCE & TECHNOLOGY**

This term, our major theme is entitled 'What's It Made Of'? Students will investigate the properties of materials used to make everyday objects. After reading 'Goldilocks and the Three Bears', Kindergarten students will be working on a STEM lesson with their Year 6 Buddies to create model furniture for Goldilocks using everyday materials. Students will become familiar with the keyboard using the 'BBC Dance Mat Typing' program.

#### **HISTORY & CREATIVE ARTS**

The Kindergarten students will continue the History unit of Personal and Family Histories. They will relate to stories about their families' and communities' past and explore a point of view within an historical context and learn about celebrations and commemorations.

#### **VISUAL ARTS**

The Kindergarten students will be learning how to create lines as this is one of the first elements of art that sets the foundation for art making. This concept empowers students to see how simple lines can turn into shapes and eventually, into advanced subjects and structures.

#### PDHPE

Kindergarten will continue to participate with the sports program provided by Sports in Schools Australia (SISA) on Thursday afternoons. They will be developing their fundamental motor and team building skills. Children will be required to wear their sports uniform.

The Child Protection unit being implemented this term to help students to understand how to keep themselves safe, who to seek support from when they feel unsafe and to gain developmentally appropriate skills for building respectful relationships.

#### ASSEMBLY

This term, Kindergarten students will meet for a grade assembly on Fridays 12:45 -1:10 pm in the K-Yellow classroom. Students will receive information relevant for kindergarten to understand our school expectations and will practice the Manly West school song and The Australian National Anthem. One student from each Kindergarten class will receive a Merit Award each week. If your child is receiving an 'Expectation Award' you will be invited to come along and celebrate your child's achievement.

#### SUPPORTING with READING

Never underestimate the reading and writing skills your child receives from listening to you reading to them and a daily opportunity to read their sight words and decodable readers to you. It is imperative that your child gains confidence when reading and becomes fluent to gain comprehension. You can support your child by encouraging them to re-read their decodable readers. As students begin to gain all the necessary reading skills they will be open to an exciting new world of reading independently enabling them to gain knowledge through texts in all subject areas and to gain the valuable love of reading.

## PARENT SUPPORT & MANDATORY REQUIREMENTS:

We welcome and appreciate all parent/caregivers support in our Kindergarten classrooms, during Literacy, Mathematics and Computer lessons. As part of the NSW Department of Education Policy, every volunteer **must** complete a Working with Children check application at the school office using a 100 point identity check. Every classroom has a **QR code** in which every visit, volunteers are required to use or sign in at the school office. This information is mandatory to ensure in the event of an emergency evacuation, every person is accounted for.

#### **RAINY DAYS:**

In the mornings between 8:50 am -9:20 am Manly West Teachers are rostered on duty in the main asphalt area of the playground. We ask parents to avoid waiting with their child/children on the Kindergarten Veranda as teachers have regular meetings at this time. If it begins to rain during this time Kindergarten Students are required to go under the Cola situated in front of the coloured equipment area.

#### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

- > Library and Sport days will remain the same as last term.
- Waste-Free is every Wednesday.
- Please ensure your child has their hat for school each day as they can become quite upset if asked to play in the shade due to not having a hat.
- Winter uniform can be worn, please ensure all items of clothing are labelled with your child's name and class on it.

# From May 2024, our school, along with thousands of others across the country, will participate in the Australian Early Development Census (AEDC).

Every school counts

Our school will take part in the AEDC between May and July this year. The AEDC is a national census that is conducted every three years by the Australian Government, in partnership with state and territory governments. It measures how children have developed by the time they start their first year of full-time school.

The AEDC is voluntary and it does not measure how well children are doing at school, nor how their school compares to other schools. Instead, it shows how children are growing and progressing in five key areas, what is being done well and what can be improved. AEDC data is used by schools, early childhood organisations, researchers and governments to help plan and improve services and supports for children and families. This is why it is important for all children in their first year of school to be included in the AEDC. # What does this mean for your child?

The AEDC is completed by teachers based on their knowledge of the children. Children do not need to do anything to be included in the census and will attend class as usual while the census is conducted.

Teachers will answer questions about the five key areas of early childhood development, which are: physical health and wellbeing, emotional maturity, social competence, language and cognitive skills (school-based), and communication skills and general knowledge. # You can be confident that your child's privacy will be protected.

We understand how important it is to keep your child's information private. This is why the AEDC uses a secure website to collect and keep their information.

# What do parents need to do?

For the purposes of the AEDC, the Australian Government Department of Education seeks your consent to collect personal information about your child from our school. This includes known information about your child's health.

# If you consent to the collection of your child's information, you do not need to do anything.

# If you do not consent to the collection of your child's information, please contact your child's class teacher before Friday the 17<sup>th</sup> of May and no information about your child will be collected.

You can also withdraw your consent after this time. If you do so, then the Australian Government Department of Education will stop using your child's information and will not provide it to anyone else. However, information that has already been shared, reported or published cannot be removed and may continue to be used (but your child will not be individually identified in that information).
